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## Help Us Meet Our Goal

Wolf Hollow has been in operation for 38 years and we plan to continue for at least 38 more, but right now we must focus on shorter term goals.

We would like to go into 2022 feeling strong and ready to take on the new year, with funding to feed and care for our wild patients, pay our professional staff and maintain our facility. That is such a modest goal. Couldn't we come up with something more exciting and adventurous? Absolutely! We have no end of ideas about ways

we'd like to develop our operations, improve our programs and enhance our facilities. But, after a year of soaring costs and plummeting donations, we must be realistic. First, we must ensure that can continue to operate and provide a service to injured wildlife and our local community. Then, when these costs are covered, we

can dream and plan for future improvements. Sadly, that is the reality of small non-profit organizations.

But we are hopeful. We believe we can do it. Why? Because we have YOU in our corner.

In 2020 support from generous donors and CARES Act grant funds kept Wolf Hollow afloat, but in 2021 we saw a 25% reduction in funding com-

pared to 2020. This past year we received some generous donations, for which we are extremely grateful,

and also received a few grants that enabled us to carry out essential projects. However, grants cover only a small percentage of our running costs and are often targeted for specific projects such as improving enclosures or purchasing specialized equipment.

Wolf Hollow does not regularly receive funding from county, state, or federal governments, so we rely on donations from individuals, companies, and foundations. You have shown time and time again just how much you care about wildlife in need, so with your support we know we can reach our goal.

Eight young people from all over Washington State carried out Wildlife Rehabilitation Internships at Wolf Hollow during summer and fall 2021. Each spent 9 weeks with us and learned skills ranging from tube-feeding seal pups and hand-feeding tiny nestling swallows to catching squirrels and setting up enclosures for owls. They observed intake exams and helped release animals back into the wild. Our last intern of the year left in late October and we are now accepting applications for 2022. ### **An Unexpected Success**

Sometimes we get a pleasant surprise when an injured animal heals much better and faster than we expect. This happened this fall with an adult Great Blue Heron that arrived thin, weak and unable to fly. When we did an intake exam and took radiographs, we discovered that the ulna of the left wing was broken. Luckily the break was in the middle of the bone, not near a joint, and the pieces were not touching the radius, (the other long bone in the outer part of the wing). When we consulted our vet, she agreed that the injury was an excellent candidate for surgery, so the heron was sent off to the vets. However, when Dr. Besel began the surgery, she found that the ulna was already repairing itself and was stabilizing. So, she put on a wing wrap and sent the bird back to us for care. We continued to keep the wing wrapped, did physical therapy every other day for a week then took more radiographs. We were concerned because it looked like the calcifying bone may be bridging over to the radius, which would mean that the bones would fuse, the bird would be unable to rotate that part of its wing and wouldn't be able to fly. However, a week later, the next radiograph showed that the two bones were remaining separate, and the break was healing well. We moved the heron outside for some stretching room and soon it was demonstrating great flying skills in our larger enclosures. After about a month of care we took the heron to False Bay and bid it adieu. It was wonderful to see this big bird be returned to the wild, where it flew and flew out across the bay.
